Her prediction also takes into account the historical fact that **no European team has ever won the World Cup on South American soil**.

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Rachel Riley, a mathematician and presenter, has **been commissioned by Ladbrokes** to use statistical analysis to predict the World Cup winner. Considering factors like goal average, win rates, climate and geography, **she suggests that the key to winning is not peaking too soon with a win rate of between 50 and 66 per cent in the qualifying rounds**. Based on these factors, she predicts that Chile will win the World Cup. Her prediction also takes into account the historical fact that no European team has ever won the World Cup on South American soil.

Rachel Riley, a mathematician and presenter, has been commissioned by Ladbrokes to use statistical analysis to predict the World Cup winner. She considered factors like goal average, win rates, climate and geography. She found that not peaking too soon with a win rate of between 50 and 66 per cent in the qualifying rounds and **maintaining a goal scoring average of 2.1** are key to winning. **Interestingly, no pre-tournament favourites have lived up to their billing since 1986**.
